Quantock South, with its deep valleys, steep jungle covered hillsides and lack of fine detail is ideally suited to long legs where good route choice is critical. Green had the most radical change from its usual succession of short legs, but the planning philosophy seemed to be appreciated. I tried to give a scenic quality to courses. However what competitors on Brown felt when on the way from 130 and looking North over the valley they had to cross to finish, is unrecorded. My favourite control site was the crag (132) on Blue and Brown, in a patch of untypical terrain revealed only on the latest survey.

For the record, a total of 40 controls were used, with Yellow and White accounting for 12 of them. If the fastest splits are added, the resulting times for courses are: Brown 69.10, Blue 55.37, Green 46.48, Light Green 33.01, Orange 28.46, Yellow 15.28 (winner's time), White 9.56. The prize for the fastest run from 122 to the Finish goes to Tim Britton on Blue.

Thanks are due to three people in particular: Jim Nickolls, for Sportident programming; Bill Vigar, for correcting and adding detail to his map as the planning proceeded, and setting up the overprints and descriptions; and Alan Simpson the Controller, for finding a few errors, improving a few legs, and helping to bag maps on the eve of the event. And last but not least, to those who helped collect in controls.

Controller's Comments

It was a real pleasure to make several visits to the forest. It teems with deer, and there are many tiny animal tracks. Also the colours of this magnificent autumn were stunning. On the day, sadly the weather was dismal, and I am sure you appreciated the pre-marked maps, with the extra benefit of a 1:7500 scale for the white and yellow. Yes - the terrain is physical, particularly the less well-used southern section. The northern blocks, only really visited by brown on this occasion, are sublime.

It is an education to work with Arthur. His courses, though always pushing the colour standards to the limit, are finely weighted and tuned, seeking to maximise the opportunities within the terrain. Doubtful controls are never tolerated. But should you give competitors a chance to settle in with a couple of straight-forward legs at the start, or is it fair to exact the maximum penalty for poor decision-making from the outset? I always consider that orienteering is work - I find that any other mental approach leads to disappointment. So, green was the pick of the bunch, with the immediate challenge of route choice on two long legs. But we should have flagged more clearly the intended route on the footpath through the chalet area on leg 3-4, as several competitors did not pick this up.

This was QO's first venture with Sportident, a practice run for their National Event next year. The well-oiled QO team, led by Richard, took it in their stride, with grateful thanks to the experts from BOK, who were extremely helpful and supportive. Well done to QO for a thoroughly professional event.
